Attention to 'race' and/or ethnicity: guidance pilot (June 2009)

Information for authors

Joseph Rowntree Foundation is currently funding a project that is exploring the feasibility and desirability of developing guidance to support commissioners and researchers to improve the quality of research that pays attention to issues of race and ethnicity.

The project responds to growing concerns that research which includes consideration of race and ethnicity issues is not always conducted with sufficient scientific and ethical rigour and that this can compromise the usefulness of the evidence generated. The publication stage is identified as a critical point within the research cycle where researchers can be prompted to consider ways of improving the quality of their published work in this area.

Guidance for authors and reviewers has therefore been developed for piloting and the Editors of *Diversity in Health & Care* have agreed that the journal can be used as a site for the pilot phase of the project.

We are inviting all authors to read and consider the guidance when preparing their paper for submission. The guidance is also being offered to reviewers who may choose to use the guidance to assist in their assessment of your paper.

The guidance checklist is for authors and reviewers own use and will not be accessed by the research team. However feedback will be sought from authors and reviewers on the usefulness and appropriateness of the guidance. With your agreement Dr. Sarah Salway of Sheffield Hallam University, who is leading this pilot work, will contact you to invite you to contribute your views by a short e-questionnaire. The e-questionnaire can be assessed by clicking here.

Please note that Dr. Salway will <u>not</u> have access to the reviewers' comments. Reviewers and authors will <u>only</u> be asked about the usefulness of the guidance.

Voluntary participation: You are of course free to choose whether or not to (i) read and consider the guidance in preparing your manuscript, and (ii) provide feedback on the guidance to the research team and your decision will not affect the way in which *Diversity in Health and Care* handles your article.

Findings from the pilot will be presented in aggregate, anonymised form, will be made freely available and will be used to inform the future development of the guidance to authors and reviewers in the longer term.
