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732. Rethinking the Quality of an Educational Philosophy Approach and the Methods Employed in Black Mountain College Regarding the Matter of the Hikikomori Phenomenon in Adulthood

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ABSTRACT This paper will examine the importance of an art-centred liberal arts education method provided by the experimental college, Black Mountain College in North Carolina, to address the matter of the Hikikomori phenomenon. The College serves as a part of the process in its students' lives, and for their personal growth and understanding in the form of intellectual pursuits.¹ 'Hikikomori', which is originally a Japanese term, identifies a person who is self-isolated and has remained in their room for more than six months². It can in some cases extend to more than two decades. This paper mainly focuses on this phenomenon among adults. In adults, the condition can be caused by low self-esteem and low self-confidence, resulting from societal pressure, and experiences of anxiety and depression. To confront the phenomena, to instil a sense of responsibility and a competent of one's original skills and abilities are consequential.³ The paper uses the College as an example for orienting the philosophy and methods, which focus on encountering each student's unique identity⁴. Through a review of Hikikomori contexts, this research concludes that the quality of an artcentered higher education can serve as a means for illuminating the Hikikomori phenomenon in a way that can return self-esteem and self-confidence to adults, and help them to become autonomously engaged in society.
